How to make footnotes in Write-N-Cite

If you are using a campus network computer, Write-N-Cite is already loaded as an Add-In to Word.

If you are using your own computer, login to RefWorks and follow the instructions to download Write-N-Cite.




- 1) Save sources in your RefWorks folder
- 2) Open Word, then within Word open Write-N-Cite (under ADD-INS tab)



3) Start writing. When you are ready to make a footnote, choose the **REFERENCES** tab and select **Insert Footnote**



4) Click on the footnote in Word, then in Write-N-Cite select **Cite** for the appropriate citations. At this, point, the citations will be formatted in RefWorks code:



5) To convert the RefWorks code into a proper footnote, choose **Chicago (*With Notes)** or **Turabian (*With Notes)** as the Output Style, then select **Create Bibliography**
